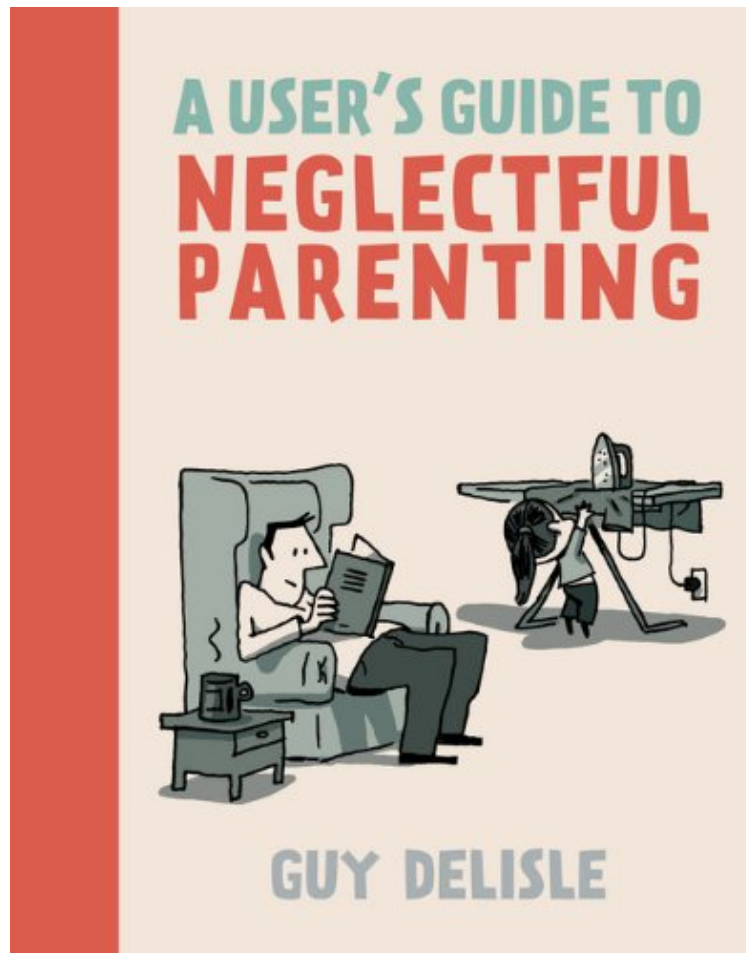

But I, like many of his fans, got to know his work through his travelogues. So, while this sort of storytelling might not be new to the author, it feels new to me. And I enjoyed it. I can't lie; it doesn't hold a candle Pyongyang, Shenzen, Burma Chronicles, and Jerusalem, but it's enjoyable nonetheless. "Neglectful Parenting" shows another side of the author, who is at his best when he is at his most autobiographical. It's fun to see the man in his own element, in his own country, and with his same trademark visual style. The book is fun, light, and heartfelt. I finished the whole thing in about an hour, and it left me wanting more...but probably more of something else. If you're a fan of Guy Delisle's work, you'll probably enjoy this on some level. book ('graphic novel') authors. This is a narrower, but more personal, expression of the Delisle experience we're used to from his other work in books such as 'Jerusalem' and 'Pyongyang'. The cover illustration pretty much says it all. A User's Guide to Neglectful Parenting is enjoyable, but not in the same league in terms of the storytelling or artwork of his other books. The comic strip origin of the material is very evident. Might be okay as a bathroom book, except you would probably finish it before you, um, finished.

Meditations on fatherhood from the author of Jerusalem: Chronicles from the Holy City With A User's Guide to Neglectful Parenting, the trademark dry humor that pervades Guy Delisle's landmark and praised graphic travelogues takes center stage. Quick, light vignettes play on the worries and cares any young parent might have, and offer wry solutions to the petty frustrations of being a dad who works from home. Readers familiar with Delisle's stranger-in-a-strange-land technique for storytelling (employed in Jerusalem, Pyongyang, Burma, and Shenzhen) will recognize the titular parent in this book; Delisle's travelogues were simultaneously portraits of complex places and times, and portraits of a stay-at-home dad's ever-changing relationship with his children while his wife is out working for Doctors Without Borders. The relationship between young child and all-too-irony-aware parent is beautifully done here, and Delisle's loose flowing style has been set free, creating a wonderful sense of motion throughout.
