Brandon T. Sniders wit and humor are sufficiently irreverent to provide endless amusement for those

readers. Expressions and jokes are consistent with the same types tweens and middle schoolers engage in and appreciate. These aspects make the book one that those readers will want to explore and to share with friends. Zachary Sterlings colorful graphic-style illustrations are appropriate for the style of the book and enhance the impact of the text. Printed on high-gloss paper, the clarity of the illustrations makes them very enjoyable. If there is a significant downside to Adventure Time: Hero Time with Finn and Jake: The Ultimate Guide to Becoming a Genuine Legend, it is the size and style of fonts used for the text. Increasing the difficulty further, much of the text was printed on colored backgrounds. Some wording, printed on certain colors of page, was so tiny as to be almost impossible for even individuals with 20/20 vision to read. Dense, detailed paragraphs and word-filled pages require work to read all the information presented. Fun features include a colorful poster at the books end, a note from Mr. Pig, a lost-and-found poster for a missing penguin, cards, a turn wheel and a popout. I did like the positive references to characteristics that create a hero. Finn and Jake repeatedly emphasized that being a hero isn't easy; it takes hard work and understanding. Other sections of the book include advice or information that parents may provide, but that the age group ignores because they are sure parents do not know and have not experienced the same types of emotional turmoil. Because of the humor used in the presentation of the information, tween and young teen readers may be more willing to talk their concerns over with a responsible adult. Their last instructions for becoming a hero are printed in bold letters. Never. Give. Up ... Those words are excellent advice for anyone. I would have liked Adventure Time: Hero Time with Finn and Jake: The Ultimate Guide to Becoming a Genuine Legend much better had the font-size and style been readable without my cheaters. I've got most of the books (including the cookbook which has some really great recipes) so reading this latest offering was a given. The thing I noticed immediately is that this book is written in a style that makes it a little less for the younger crowd. The style is more mature, there's a smaller font than in previous books, and it presents some good advice for readers. Take the interview with Princess Bubblegum - I expected it to be about her as a princess, her relationship with Finn, etc., but it was about how much she loves being a scientist and experimenting and how being a hero means being kind to people, learning, and getting involved. The whole book is like this, and I love it. Yes, it has cutesy things like a spiral pull out Lady Rainicorn, but the underlying message running through everything in the book is how to be a good person. The author has done an excellent job of weaving a very important lesson into a wacky story line ruled by a shape-shifting dog and his human best friend who loves adventure as much as he does. Jake the Dog and Finn the Human might not always be the sharpest tools in the shed, but in this hero guidebook they and the other inhabitants of Ooo have a lot of fun telling and showing the reader how to be a real hero while the whole time subtly teaching them some very important life skills. I was a bit surprised that this latest book wasn't as whimsical and fluffy others the author has written, so big kudos to him for taking on the difficult task of educating the reader on the sly. Younger readers will enjoy this latest Finn and Jake book, and will hopefully soak up the overall message of "be good to do good". Older readers will like the story as well, but maybe a little less since there isn't as much action and adventure as prior books. The "An Adventure a Day" calendar could be a fun summer vacation activity, as could other parts of the book like the one in the beginning about how to tackle a mystery. The pull-outs and pop-ups are cute, and the love letter from Mr. Pig to Tree Trunks was so sweet (and with a few changes could make a great set of vows for an Adventure Time themed wedding!). It's a hard back with good paper and lots of graphic elements. Given the small font and the large amount of text in places I'm going to say that this book is intended for 6th (possibly 5th) graders on up. Younger children can certainly enjoy the images and the shorter bits of text within boxes so I wouldn't not get this book for fans. Just wanted to give you a heads up as to fact that this isn't a cakewalk and there is stuff that older kids will like. I have a high schooler and she snuck off with this volume to enjoy in her teencave. Personally, I didn't find this book as entertaining as some of Snider's others works, like BEMO'S CHARACTER GUIDE, but the kids outrank me and they say it's funny and fun.
