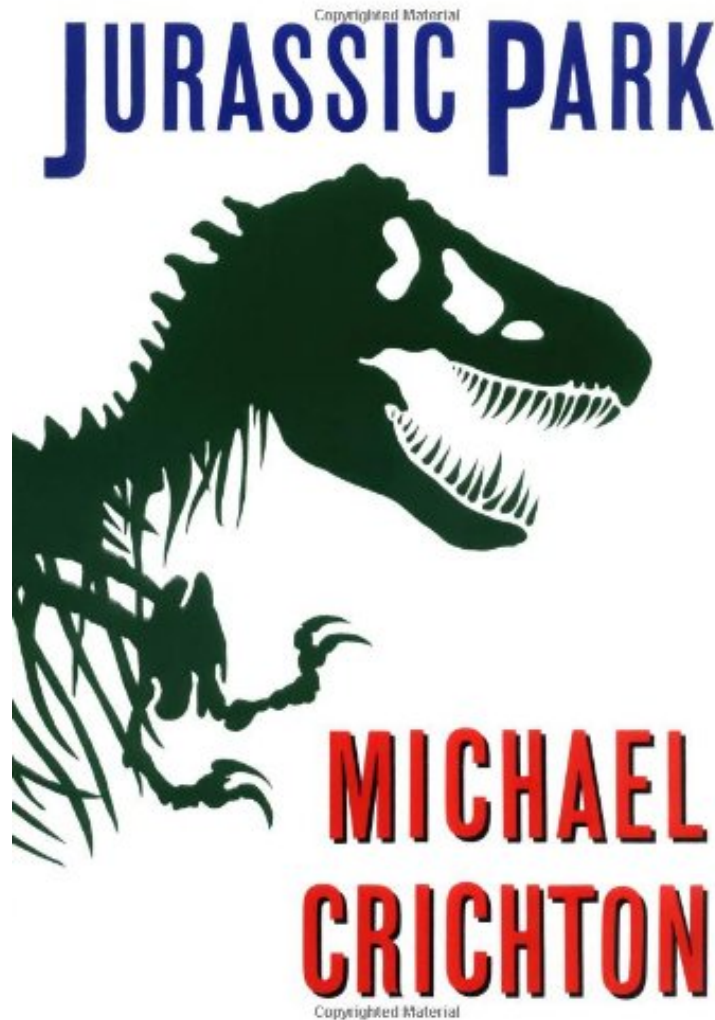

As I read more and more of this book I kept asking myself, "what took me so long to read this?" This is one of the best books I've read in a long time. I gave it 5 stars and I don't think I've given any book 5 stars yet this year.

Michael Crichton's Jurassic Park tells the story of an island in Costa Rica ran by John Hammond and his crew. John Hammond and his crew are attempting to recreate dinosaurs in order to open the first dinosaur theme park, Jurassic Park! In some ways this idea seems amazing! Giving people a chance to walk among dinosaurs could be a breakthrough no one saw coming! What we forget is that dinosaurs are creatures that we have never physically lived with while at the same time they have never been exposed to us, so of course there are going to be complications. The great thing about this book is that it was actually terrifying!
