series By Adam Adiment A friend gave me these issues to read. So keep in mind, I'm going to be a lot kinder than someone who paid a lot of money for it. Comics are a complete luxury item at this point sadly. The basic idea behind this Justice League is kind of cool and a good example of making lemonade. Steve Orlando was given the tough task of making a comic book version of the WB TV show Legends of Tomorrow essentially. Kind of lame since he works in comics and doesn't have to worry about a special effects budget like them. So, how do you handle a bunch of under super powered characters like this with Batman as their leader? You make it all about marginalization and 2nd chances. Yep, it's kind of silly but it's Batman and a rainbow coalition of goofballs trying to connect with society. It's sort of a fun idea at the same time and kind of on the nose. It's marginalizing to be the one person that can fly in the room and certainly marginalizing to be the one man dressed as a bat. It means it's a bunch of cast offs saving the collective masses that don't quite like them cause they're different. I'm sure there's a lesson to be had there. The main problem with this collection is that it's all scattershot back story and exposition of varying quality. Killer Frost is the best of the bunch for me. Orlando would probably be a cool writer for a DC version of OZ. None of the other 1 shot stories matches the same level of quality after this. Vixen is well illustrated but the story is vapid. The Ray story is so ham fisted it'd almost be satire if it wasn't so serious. The Atom left zero impression on me. The main getting the team together issue is good enough. It at least looks good. Pretty much all the illustration work here is good except The Ray issue where it looks too much like old gay men with young boys, which creepy when it's heterosexual too for the record. The dialogue in general too is rough. It's not Orlando's strong suit. He's a great ideas man and knows his way around an action sequence. If anything, it's impressive to see him trying to stretch himself here. Orlando also virtue signals a little too much. The basic virtue stuff is already built into the concept. If you signal it, it loses its impact. It becomes little more than a dog whistle to prove your value. I've been rough on the book but I like the concept. It's just there's some glaring flaws that bring the book down. A little too much virtue signalling in some cases but more importantly it's not always well executed. My friend has been giving me subsequent issues. They are pretty fun. I enjoy them a lot more than these. The issues here aren't necessary to enjoy the stuff to come but won't hurt you either.
