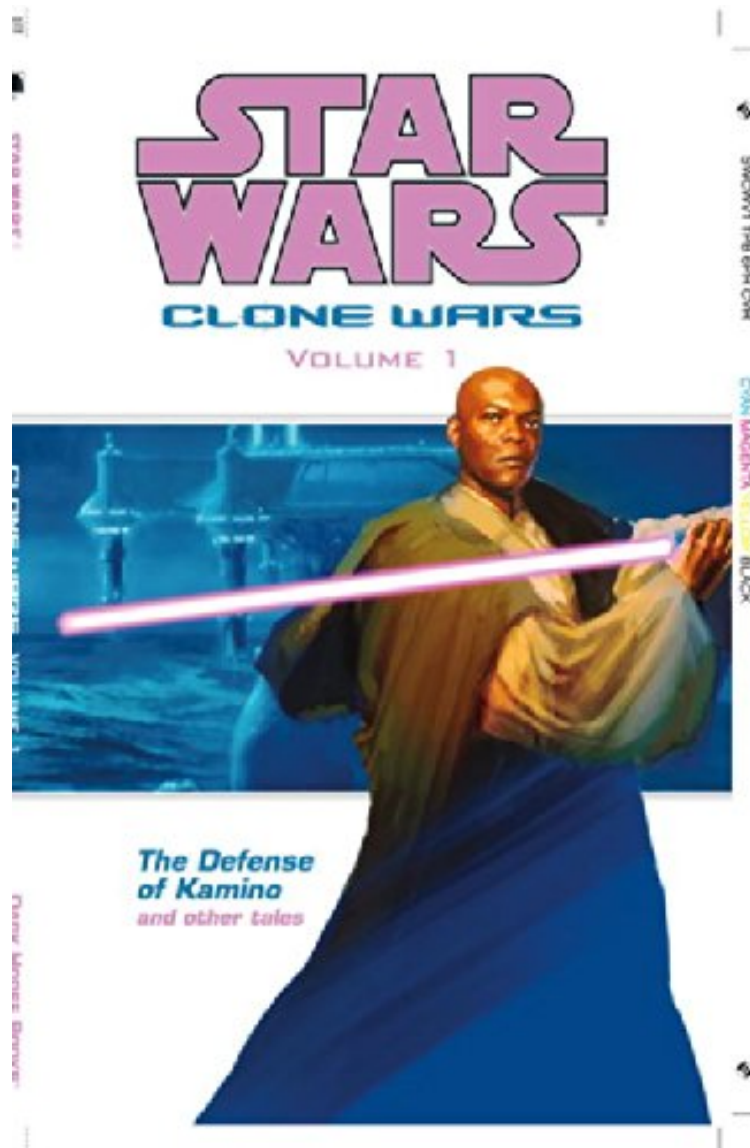

Collecting two issues of the Republic series (#49-50) and the one-shot Jedi: Mace Windu, the TPB starts with a story entitled "Sacrifice" in which Aayla Secura is tasked with finding her former Master disguised as a man named Korto Vos. His importance, however, is that he holds the plans to a future Separatist attack and must defend the plans from those that desire it! In the next issue, the attack on the Kamino cloning facility has begun and Anakin and Obi-Wan plan to draw the Separatists in and destroy them once they're planet-side. However, the battle gets to be too much for the Jedi guarding the facility and the Kaminoans decide to release the ARC Troopers, Jango's personally trained clones, from their chambers to save the day! In the final issue, Jedi: Mace Windu, the highly esteemed Jedi meets with four Jedi that, due to the atrocities of war, have not decided to side with the Jedi Order. One of these Jedi being Master Sora Bulq. However, after an attack by Asajj Ventress, Windu senses there's something more to Bulq's doubt of the Republic! This first volume continues right where the Honor and Duty TPB leaves off and where the giant Clone Wars arc of the Republic series begins! The art is fantastic and very realistically done and there's lots of characters, some new, some old, and the action and writing is very well done. Seeing the ARC Troopers in battle for the first time was a real wake-up call to how powerful the clones can be and seeing how some Jedi can walk the thin line between light and dark shows how close the Jedi Order is to falling apart.
