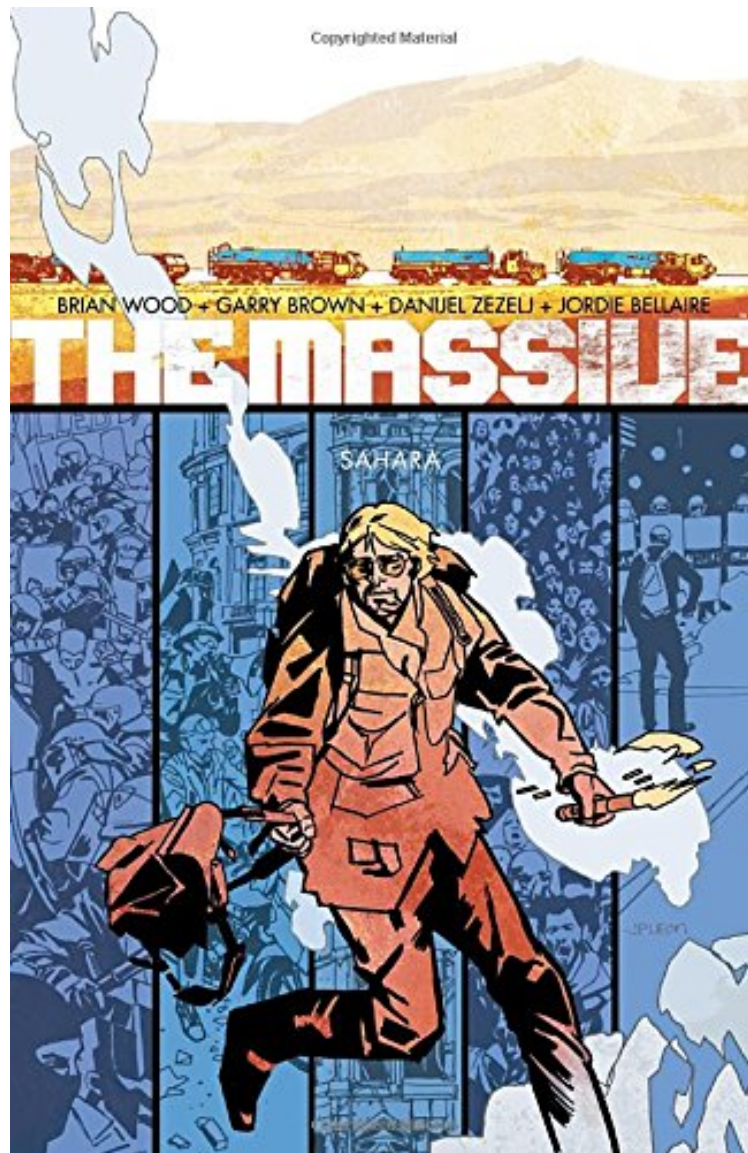

Greenagel II Volume 4 falls off a little from the high of volumes 2 and 3, but this is still a decent story about a group of environmentalists after the world has experienced a series of natural disasters, economic crashes and massive social upheavals. The major characters have gone their separate ways and are dealing with issues from their past. Cal runs into conflict with a

former mercenary, while Mag has to deal with Interpol. We learn more and more about Mary this volume, and she takes off for the Middle East/Africa to work on a water caravan (fresh water is not a resource more valuable than oil). We catch a quick glimpse of Lars and Ryan on the Kapital, but this volume is about Cal, Mag and Mary and their individual adventures. The dialogue and characters are still strong, but it unfortunately has become more about them and their past rather than about how they are going to continue to act in this new world. 0 of 0 people found the following review helpful. The ship belongs to a direct action environmental group, captained by a former mercenary, who suddenly have to confront what it means to be environmentalists at the end of the world. The art is incredible and the storyline even better. Be prepared to be shocked as Wood continues to explore the hypothetical minutiae of global collapse with unexpected character development.

Callum Israel and the crew of the Kapital face their greatest threat yet: Arkady, Israel's former colleague bent on revenge. When the Kapital is bombed in port, Callum and Mag head into the dangerous streets of post-Crash Europe to confront Arkady. But what they ultimately discover may lead them to their long lost ship The Massive! Meanwhile, Mary reappears in the Sahara desert, guarding a convoy of fresh water, holding a secret that might unravel Callum for good. The Massive begins its most powerful chapter yet as Brian Wood, Garry Brown, and Daniel Zezelj unravel the ongoing mystery of Mary and set the stage for the final act, when the cause of the Crash is revealed.
