I really enjoyed Simon Furman's run on the classic Marvel series in the late 80s and early 90s (and his UK stuff). Regeneration One does a great job of following up on a lot of major storylines from the classic Marvel run and ultimately tying them together into a story that finally felt

completed. Unfortunately, I was disappointed with Earth's fate (being as vague as possible to prevent spoilers). As the story progressed it was clear that was really the only outcome given how the story is setup at the beginning but in how significant Earth was in the first half of the original Marvel run I felt it was a bit anticlimactic. While this was a great nostalgic trip in its own right, I really felt like the old 2002 Dreamwave series came closest to bringing back the old 80's Transformers magic. The Dreamwave series wove between continuity with the old Sunbow series and the old comic, borrowing elements of both but setting it in the present day. I would love to see some kind of sequel (comic book, animated or otherwise) to the Sunbow series, whether it be after the 1986 movie or the tv show.

But it's not for everyone. The story is a continuation of the comics from the 80's; so if you're not acquainted with those stories, you won't get as much out of this book as those who do. And the art is an amalgam of the old style and the new. It's successful, but not my personal favorite. (Apologies to the artists, whom I love and respect.) The book is an interesting exercise in blending styles. There is a powerful epic battle at the end, with unexpected ramifications. The series shows promise. Buy it if you love the old books, or if you're interested in the idea of this series. Skip it if you're not either of these things.

This IDW publishing book is the continuation of the Classic Marvel Transformers comic books that lasted 80 issues from 1984-1991! Simon Furman, Andrew Wildman, and Stephen Barksville are back as the creative team that finished the original Marvel Transformers comics run back in 1991 (Transformers #69-74 #76-80). The story takes place in 2012. You will see old familiar characters both humans and Transformers a-like. The book was a wonderful joy to read because I got to revisit some familiar Autobot characters like Optimus Prime, Hot Rod, Kup, Springer along with Ultra Magnus, and The Decepticons like Megatron, Soundwave, StarScream, and Bludgeon, Humans like G.B. Blackrock and Spike Witwicky. I will warn you though the IDW Transformers Regeneration One series is darker than the original Marvel Comics Classic Transformers, (#1-#80) run. The story by Simon Furman is great! The Art by Andrew Wildman and Stephen Barksville is also very good! My only problem with Transformers Regeneration One is that Simon Furman still likes kill off old characters! How many times did I see Ratchet and Megatron die? I didn't like Ratchet and Megatron's death. I give this IDW book an A+++
